Digital Roll Call of voting members	<ul> <li>Completed roll call with attendance members listed above</li> <li>Quorum of voting members was not met at the meeting start; 7 voting members were noted.</li> </ul>	July, October, and January     Minutes will be approved at     the April meeting
Follow-Ups	<ul> <li>Dental Materials from DentaQuest were not provided with the meeting materials, but were sent by S. Young in a link. The link will be sent to the group.</li> <li>The presentation on the PHE Ending was included in the meeting materials.</li> <li>B. Robertson connected with R. Bryan about presenting additional materials about efforts to improve dental KPI performance and Celeste Ewert about connecting to Ride NOCO. Ride NOCO is slated to present in the April meeting. C. Ewert was slated to present this month, but is moving to a new role and the presentation will be provided at a later data by her replacement.</li> <li>J. Martinson's presentation from the October meeting was provided in the meeting invitation.</li> <li>The FAFSA 1 – pager N. Lawless presented on in the October meeting was provided in the meeting invitation.</li> </ul>	B. Robertson to send out materials from DentaQuest (completed on 1/27/2022).
Regional Updates	<ul> <li>J. Martinson presented on January updates from the state level noting that the regional PIAC is a part of a larger system within the state's PIAC, and her role is to be a link between the two. She welcomes feedback and items to address at the state level.</li> <li>Ongoing topics at the state level include the Public Health Emergency, specifically noting that it's important for members to have updated information as we prepare for re-enrollment. Regions also present updates at the state PIAC. Member engagement was a topic that was presented last week and is a topic for discussion in future meetings. The state PIAC also provided opportunities to learn more about equity work with Aaron Green, HCPF's Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Officer.</li> <li>Subcommittees also provide updates at the state level. Participation at the state PIAC and subcommittees is important, and Region 2 needs more representation.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>B. Robertson to add Complex Care to a future meeting agenda.</li> <li>B. Robertson to present an overview on FY21 performance for all KPI measures.</li> </ul>



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	<ul> <li>K. Snelson noted the value of participation at the meetings is the ability to provide a voice. B. Robertson noted that one subcommittee, the Performance Measurement and Member Engagement (PMME) was looking for new voting members. Participation at the meetings provides a voice with the state, and participating as a voting members enables the ability to influence the decisions that impact the region.</li> <li>B. Robertson noted that there were three audits occurring in the next couple of months. One is a compliance audit that will take place in March, another is a 411 audit which is an audit over 411 behavioral health charts, and another is a Quality of Care audit that will begin on February 1. A fourth audit on Utilization Management with SUD will occur in the summer. The Quality of Care and SUD UM audits were first discussed by the state the previous day. Preliminary Behavioral Health Incentive Program (BHIP) results were provided by HCPF this week, and our FY22 performance will be presented in the April meeting once those measures are finalized.</li> <li>M. Strickland noted the Complex Member definition change, and that NHP opted to self-define the Complex Member group. The process is a multi-step process beginning with the definition, then partnering with care coordinators, engagement with our complex members, and measurement. The definition has been approved by the state, and we will keep the committee informed of progress. B. Robertson noted that this was not discussed in detail at previous PIAC meetings and would look to get a presentation on this topic on a future meeting agenda.</li> </ul>	
Regional KPI Performance	<ul> <li>J. Mahalik presented on January's regional performance slides showing September data (data is lagged due to claims) across Key Performance Indicators (KPI), Behavioral Health Incentive Program (BHIP), and Performance Pool Measures (PP).</li> <li>KPIS</li> <li>KPI performance is just under Tier 1 for BH Engagement, Tier 2 for ED Visits, just under the Tier 1 goal for Dental visits and Prenatal Engagement. Updated well visits do not yet have data, and initial performance is expected from the state in December.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>L. Thorpe noted that she would share the top 3 ED diagnoses over the past three years (completed on 1/26/2022).</li> <li>B. Robertson to send out the COVID-19 link from the NHP website (completed on 1/27/2022)</li> </ul>

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	<ul> <li>Regional activities to boost performance include the Smiling Stork campaign from Denta Quest, and data exploration for potential interventions with foster care, ED visits, and prenatal engagement.</li> <li>L. Bakalyan noted outreach efforts for well visits as part of the Early Pediatric Screening, Diagnostic, and Treatment (EPSDT), which will impact the well visit KPI.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>ED data was explored with regional partners. B. Robertson noted the rise in ED visits, the shift in the goal lines, and regional performance about to drop to the Tier 1 level. J. Bacon noted COVID-19 as a significant contributor to the ED, but also noted complexity after COVID-19 as influencing the rise in ED visits. Another component is people showing up to the ED for rapid-result COVID-19 tests. L. Thorpe further noted that Brush has seen a 5-10% increase over the last three months in their ED volumes. L. Thorpe noted that she would share the top 3 ED diagnoses over the past three years.</li> <li>Potential interventions could be around communication/education with COVID-19 testing (where to go or who to reach out to), aligning to the PCP, and reconnecting members to their PCP. L. Bakalyan noted the NHP website has numerous resources regarding vaccines and testing.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>BHIP</li> <li>SUD Outpatient engagement is below the goal. This point was further explored for definitions (a member who received two or more visits within 30 days after an initial outpatient visit for SUD). L. Hickman noted workforce challenges with both retaining and hiring SUD staff.</li> <li>Inpatient Mental Health Follow-Up and ED SUD Follow-Up are also below the goal.</li> <li>Follow-Up After Positive Depression Screen and Foster Care are above the goal. The BH Follow-up Measure may possibly be impacted by the state's Performance Improvement Project (PIP). The Foster Care measure has a low denominator which crates variability in performance across months.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>Performance Pool</li> <li>Extended Care Coordination and Preterm Birth are slightly below the goal line.</li> </ul>	



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Hoalth Equity	<ul> <li>The Department of Corrections (DOC) Engagement metric is above the goal.</li> <li>New measures on medication adherence, asthma, and postpartum care are in process. Measures are near finalization as questions are answered from the state, but these measures will be reported to the committee in the near future.</li> </ul>	. I Toylor to provide mane and
Health Equity	<ul> <li>L. Taylor presented on the Immigrant and Refugee Center of Northern Colorado (IRC NoCo) an organization based in Greeley/Evans area, but serving the members across the state which covers the 10 counties in the region.</li> <li>Mission of the IRC NoCo is to empower immigrants and refugees, connect communities, and advocate for successful integration. IRC NoCo strives to provide integration support and celebrate their heritage in partnership to help immigrants thrive while turning Colorado into their home.</li> <li>IRC NoCo's main service is educational efforts and provides six levels of English language instruction to help improve language access. Language access help clients better integrate and allows them to better advocate for themselves.</li> <li>Workplace Readiness skills is another program component of IRC NoCo and is incorporated into the language instruction. Digital literacy (such as banking, e-mail, and job searching) is also taught.</li> <li>The IRC NoCo has a referral source on the website, and also offers course schedules on-line. Clients are welcome anytime.</li> <li>Community Navigation encompasses, in its most basic form, is case management. Community Navigators are staff members who represent the communities served; offering language and cultural knowledge to better meet client needs. Support ranges from reading mail to helping complete citizenship applications. Community Navigators also provide insight from community Navigators also provide insight from community Perspectives that better surface barriers and solutions.</li> <li>IRC NoCo's final pillar is advocacy efforts also offers advocacy efforts including youth empowerment and women's empowerment that help specific client groups to better advocate for themselves.
